Commitment to Access



Student Profile

- 95% of all enrolled students came from California, including 93% of undergraduate transfers
- More than half of CSU students are students of color
- One-third of undergraduates are first in their families to attend college
- 49% of undergraduates are recipients of a Pell Grant

Transfer Admissions Eligibility

- 60 semester/90 quarter units
 - 30 units of general education
- 4 basic skill courses (Area A & B4)
 - Grades of “C” or higher
 - 2.0 cumulative GPA in transferable college work
- Access transfer admissions information via: calstate.edu/transfer

CSU Admissions Definitions

- **Impaction** – When a program or level (first-time freshmen, upper-division transfer) or campus receives more applications from eligible students during the initial application filing period than can be accommodated given the available resources
- **Local** – students who graduate from a high school or community college district historically served by the CSU campus in that region
- **Redirection** - A process that ensures that applicants eligible for admission who cannot be accommodated at their first- choice campus(es) are redirected to another CSU campus without having to complete another application for admission

Program/Major Impaction

- Occurs when a campus receives more eligible applications for a specific undergraduate program in the initial filing period than there are enrollment spaces available.
- Most campuses have at least one impacted major/program
 - **Typically impacted at upper-division level**
 - Students must meet criteria such as specific core/major prep courses, GPA in those courses, cumulative GPA, or a combination of factors

 - Removed First-Year & Environmental Resource Engineering Impaction
- San Francisco
 - Removed Apparel Design, Child Development, Dietetics, Environmental Studies Impaction
- San Marcos
 - Impacted Biological Sciences program

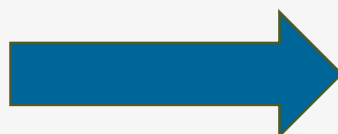

Impaction at the CSU

As you get ready to apply to the CSU, you may find that a campus or undergraduate major you're considering is "impacted," meaning there are more applications from qualified applicants than there are available spaces. If you're interested in an impacted major or campus, be sure to apply for admission during the initial filing period, October 1 to November 30.

If you're a first-time freshman or upper-division transfer student to the CSU, you can use this database to find out whether a degree program or campus you're interested in is affected by impaction.

Campus Impaction

- Occurs when campus receives more eligible applications in the initial filing period than there are enrollment spaces available for the class level (*first-year or upper division transfer*)
- Campuses fall into 3 categories:
 - Admit using CSU eligibility
 - Campus impaction (*first-year/transfer*)
 - Impacted in all programs (all majors)

Local Admission Area

- Defined by each CSU campus
- Can be different than **Service Area**
- Changes are subject to the annual impaction process
- Any changes must go through public hearings
- Applicants in a campus Local Admission Area receive priority

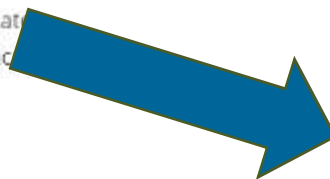

Educational Opportunity Program (EOP)


- Program at all CSU campuses
- Provides admission, academic and financial support services to historically underserved students



Accessing EOP

- All campuses accept EOP transfer applications, except Channel Islands, Dominguez Hills and Stanislaus
- Applicants can return to complete the EOP portion of the application until **January 15th**
 - 5 campuses require EOP applications by November 30th
- All EOP tiles are now under Supporting Information Quadrant on Cal State Apply

1. Educational Opportunity Program

The Educational Opportunity Program (EOP) is designed to improve access and retention of historically low-income and educationally disadvantaged students. EOP students have the potential and demonstrated motivation to perform satisfactorily at a CSU, but they have not been able to realize their fullest potential because of their economic or educational background. The program provides admission and academic assistance to EOP-eligible undergraduate students. In many cases, the program offers financial assistance to eligible students. Campuses tailor their programs to accommodate the needs of their student population.

Financial Aid in 2016-2017

- 49% of CSU bachelor's recipients graduate with zero student debt
- The average loan debt for CSU students was \$17,367 in 2017
 - *National Average \$28,650*
 - *State average \$22,785*



Financial Aid at the CSU

- In 2017, more than \$4.2 billion was distributed to more than 380,000 students
- 80% of all CSU students receive some form of financial assistance
- 61% of all undergraduates have full cost of tuition covered by grants, scholarships, or waivers

Pitfalls in the Financial Aid Process

- **Applying late:** California & CSU use a priority filing date of **March 2** for the FAFSA and DREAM applications
- Respond to requests for information from the campus
 - Students may be selected for “verification,” which requires they submit documents like tax transcripts
 - Students should check their email often and their school online portals
 - Failure to respond promptly to requests may affect the timeliness of award letters

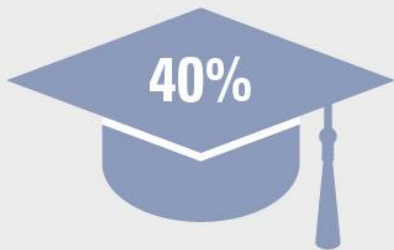

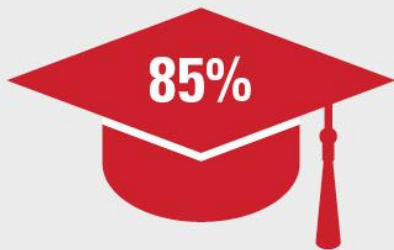

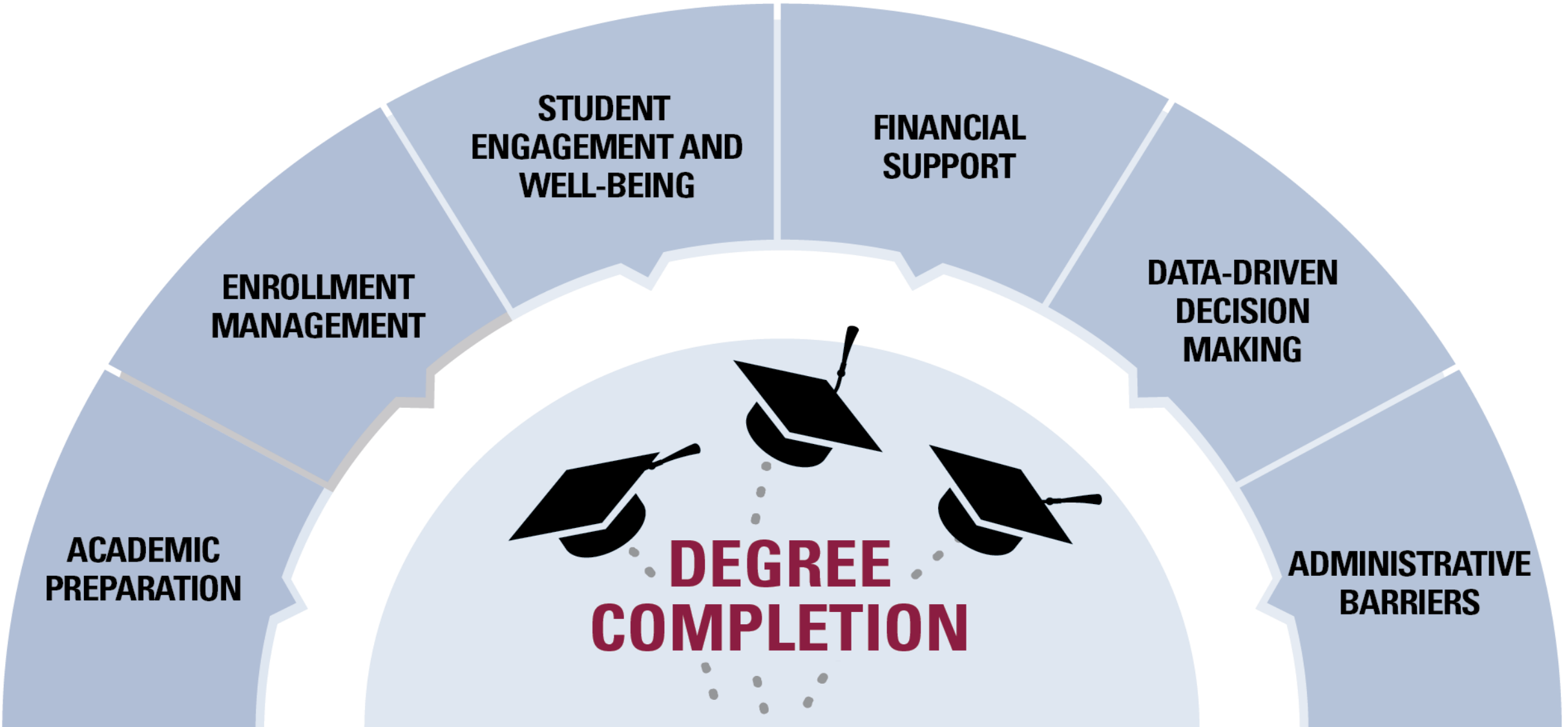

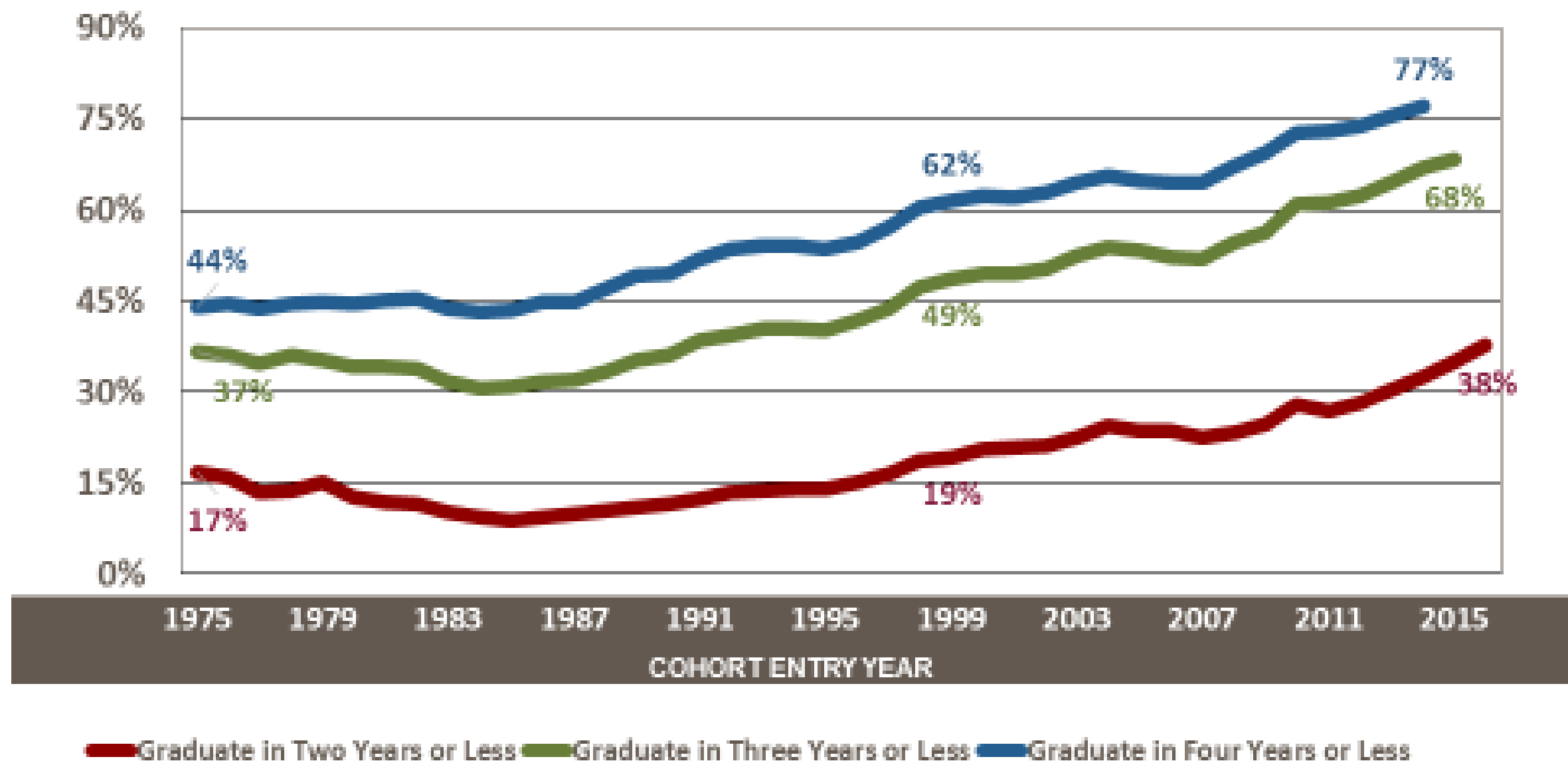

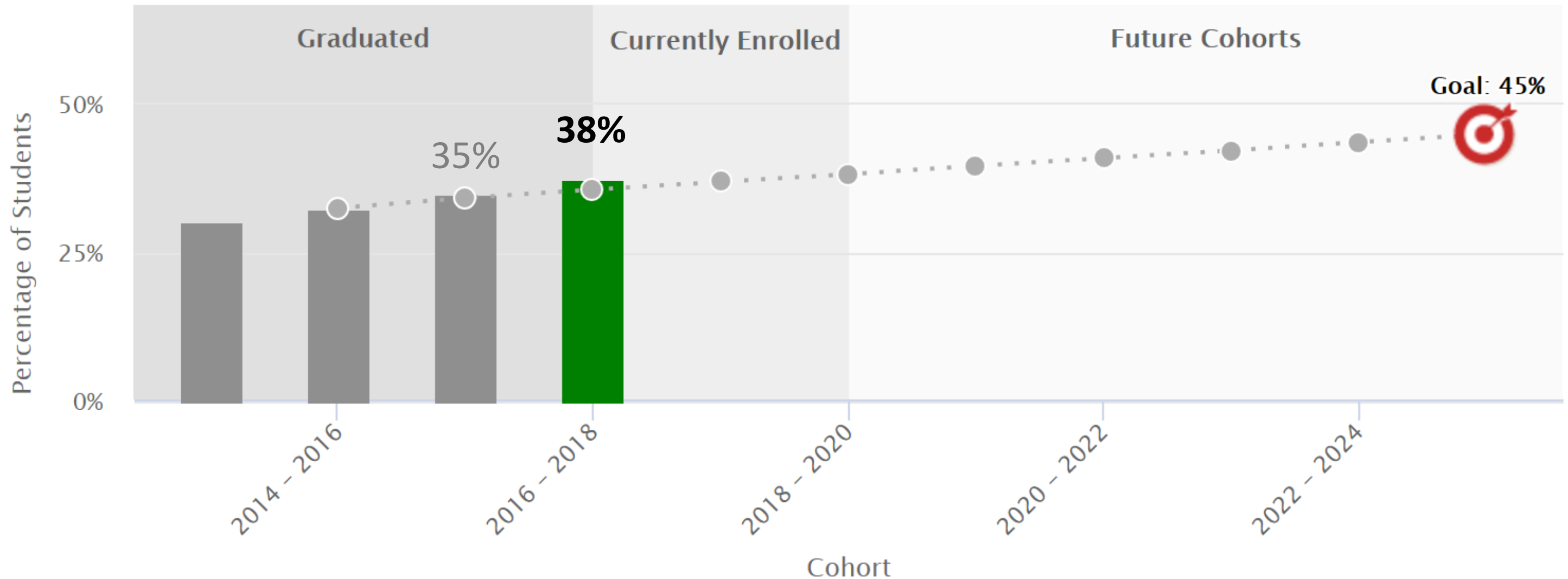

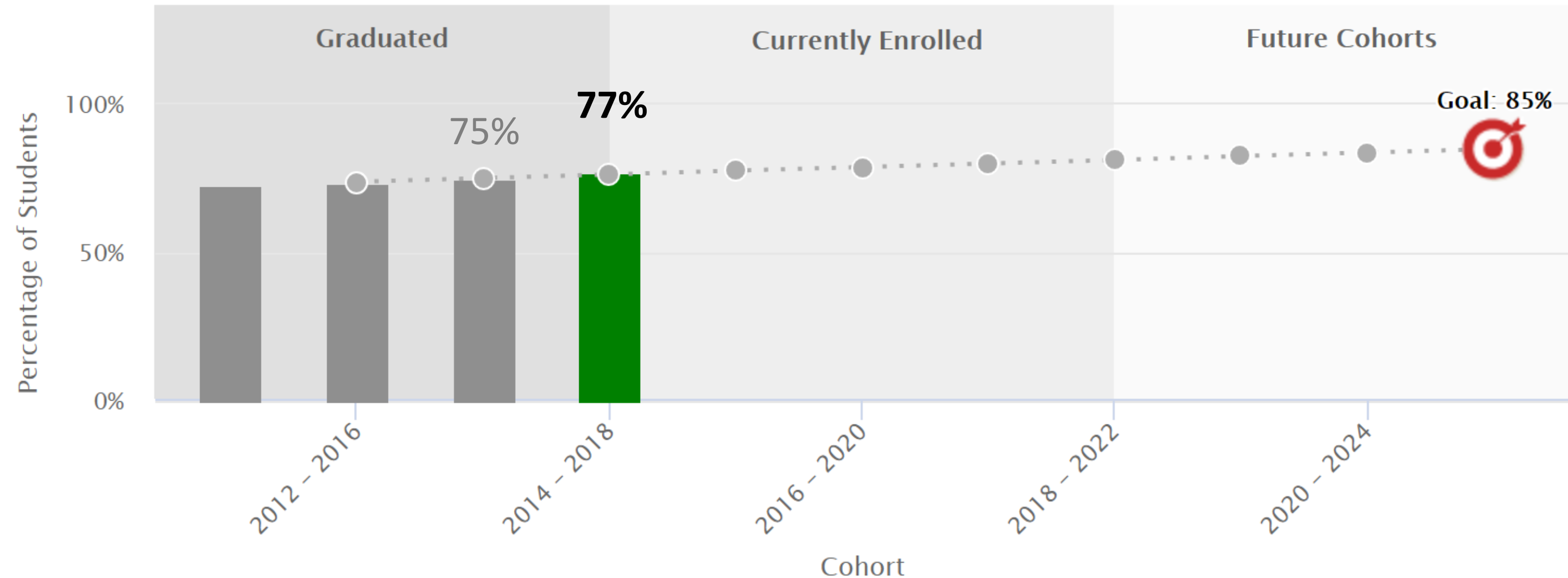
Graduation Rate Trends for Transfer Students



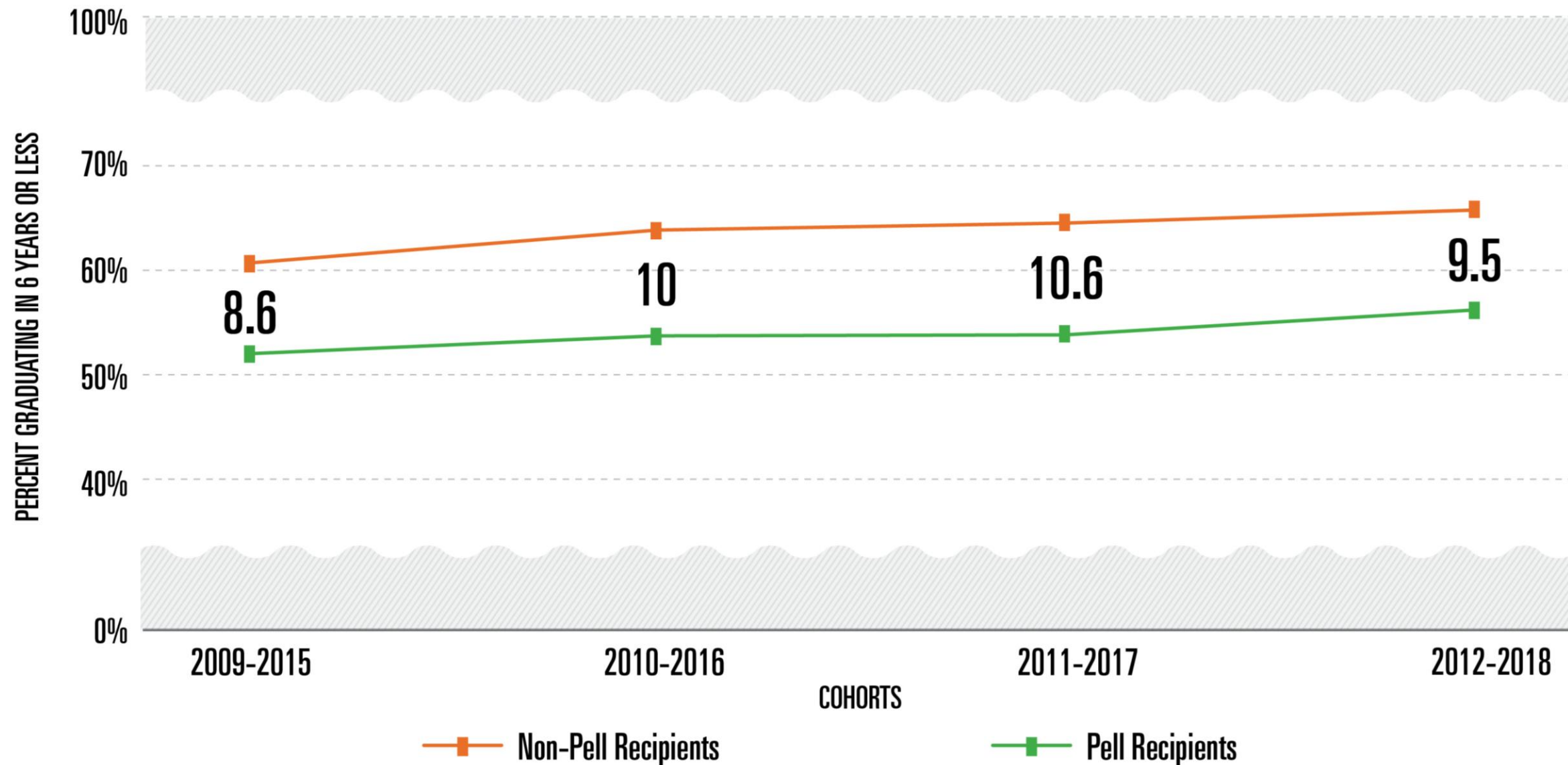
Transfer 2-Year Graduation Goal



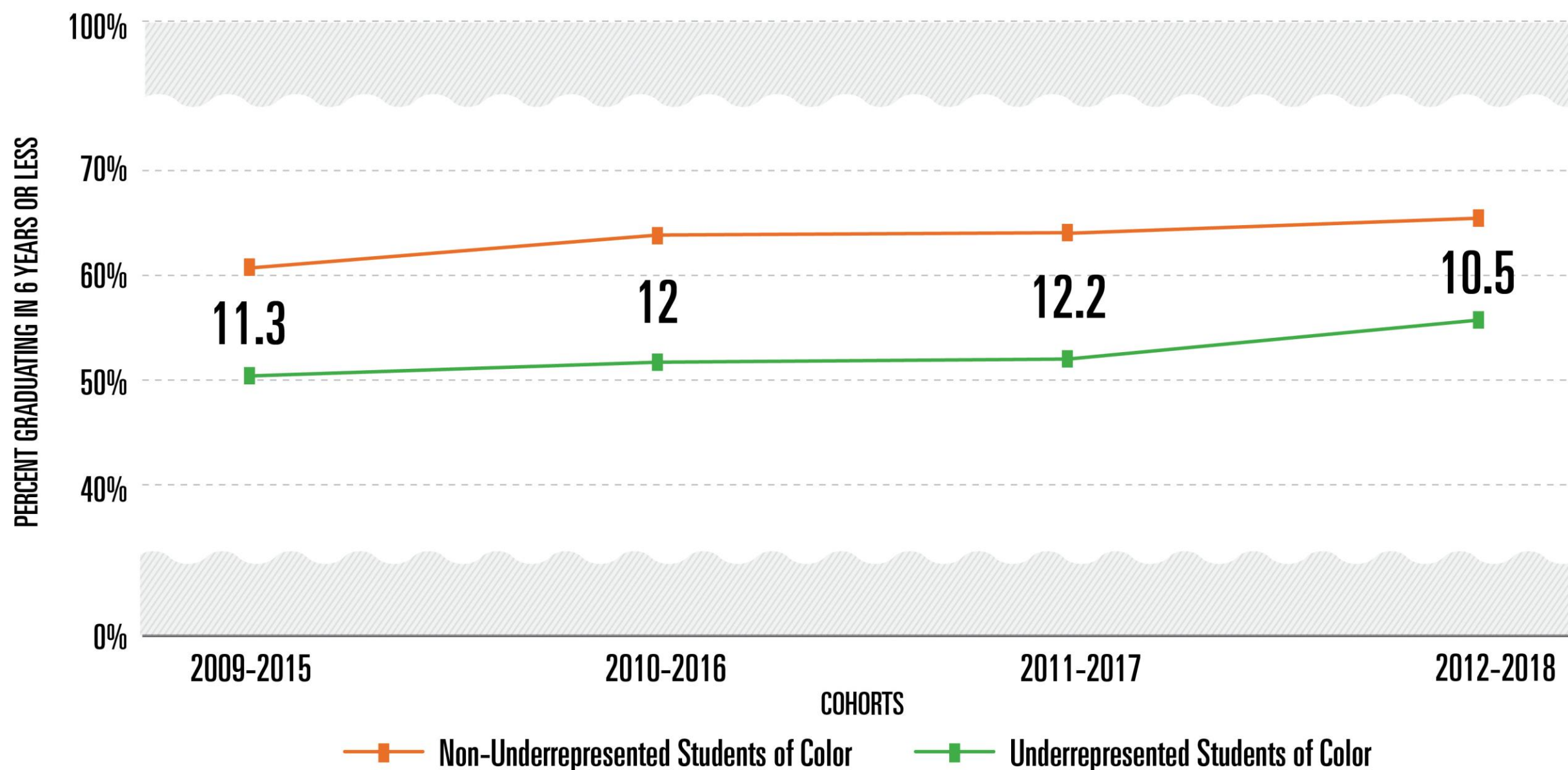
Transfer 4-Year Graduation Goal
